Tips for HOME OWNERS

- Get to know your neighbours
- Note description and license plates of suspicious vehicles
- Report any suspicious activity to Police

Tips for LANDLORDS AND PROPERTY MANAGERS (residential or commercial) Avoid potential damage to your property:

- Interview all prospective tenants or renters
- Renters may want to rent for cash, with no visible means of income, or want to rent for a third party
- Obtain a credit history, photo ID and check all references
- Check your property regularly
 - A crop may take two to three months, so checking your property every four to five weeks is recommended
 - Absentee or offshore landlords should have an agent, friend or family member checking the property for them
- Ensure you have a detailed rental agreement and those renting are actually living in or using the premises

Where do you find a **GROW OP?**

Marijuana Grow Ops can be found in any commercial or residential building.

- Homes
- Warehouses
- Commercial Properties
- Rural farm buildings
- Abandoned buildings (Urban or Rural)



How does this concern me?

Grow Ops are an accident waiting to happen and pose many risks to neighbourhoods and communities such as:

FIRE:



Exposed live wires, high intensity lamps and overheated ballasts in fluorescent lamps can cause fires. Additional ventilation fans can cause a fire to spread quickly.

ELECTROCUTIONS:



Rewiring and bypasses to supply electricity to a grow op do not meet safety code and are high risk electrical hazards. This is a danger to occupants of the home, neighbours, inspectors, utility workers and emergency responders.

STRUCTURAL DAMAGE:



If you own a home that is rented and used for a grow op, there is a significant risk of permanent structural damage and contamination to the property. This is expensive if not impossible to repair and is unlikely to be covered by insurance.

HEALTH:



Excessive moisture, chemical use and non-code venting causes carbon monoxide poisoning, toxic mould and chemical contamination which could have serious health impacts especially for children.

VIOLENCE:



Grow Ops are targeted by other criminal elements who "rip off" the crop. These home invasions pose a safety risk to neighbours as the risk of violence is higher.

How to spot a GROW OP

The presence of one or more of the following does not necessarily indicate a grow op, but they do typically share many of these features:

- Occupants of the residence are rarely seen, distant or secretive
- Covered windows with black plastic or heavy curtains
- Condensation on windows, frost build up on eaves and vents during winter, and/or lack of snow on roof
- Sound of electrical generators or fans
- Lights visible that are much brighter than normal home lighting
- "Skunky" smell of growing marijuana
- Unusual traffic at odd times of the day or night with regular visits to the property
- Unusual piles of garbage such as fertilizer containers in the garage or outside

If you suspect a grow op do not approach or investigate yourself. Contact Police or Crime Stoppers
